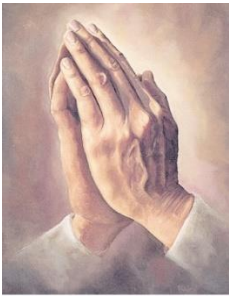

What is Holy Communion? *"Holy Communion is the body and blood of our Lord Jesus Christ given with bread and wine, instituted by Christ himself for us to eat and drink."*

Where do the Scriptures say this? *Matthew, Mark, Luke, and Paul say: Our Lord Jesus Christ, in the night in which he was betrayed, took bread; and when he had given thanks, he broke it and gave it to his disciples, saying, "Take, eat, this is my body, which is given for you; this DO in remembrance of me." After the same manner, also he took the cup after supper, and when he had given thanks, he gave it to them, saying, "Drink of it, all of you; this cup is the new testament in my blood, which is shed for you, and for many, for the remission of sins; this DO, as often as you drink it, in remembrance of me."*

Pretzel Jello

1 cup sugar

$\frac{3}{4}$ cup melted oleo

1 large pkg strawberry jello

3 cups ground or crushed pretzels

1 cup boiling water

3Tbsp sugar

1 (10oz) pkg frozen strawberries,

9oz Cool Whip

8oz cream cheese (room temperature)

Mix oleo pretzels and sugar and press into 9 x13inch pan. Bake at 400 for 8 minutes Cool

Beat cream cheese and sugar Fold in Cool Whip spread over cooled pretzel layer on bottom and up sides of pan.

Dissolve 1 large pkg strawberry Jello and 1 cup boiling water. Add thawed strawberries. Mix and pour over cream cheese layer. Cool.

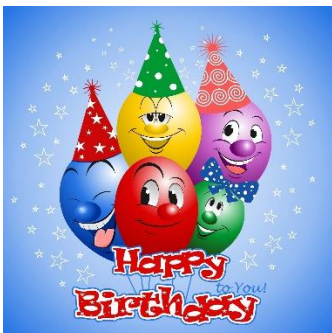

The Small Catechism by Martin Luther: The Apostles' Creed

The First Article: I believe in God, the Father almighty, creator of heaven and earth.

What does this mean? I believe that God has created me and all that exists. He has given me and still preserves my body and soul with all their powers. He provides me with food and clothing, home, and family, daily work, and all I need from day to day. God also protects me in time of danger and guards me from every evil. All this he does out of fatherly and divine goodness and mercy, though I do not deserve it. Therefore, I surely ought to thank and praise, serve, and obey him.

The Second Article: I believe in Jesus Christ, his only Son, our Lord. He was conceived by the power of the Holy Spirit and born of the virgin Mary. He suffered under Pontius Pilate, was crucified, died, and was buried. He descended into hell. On the third day he rose again. He ascended into heaven, and is seated at the right hand of the Father. He will come again to judge the living and the dead.

What does this mean? I believe that Jesus Christ, true God, Son of the Father from eternity, and true man, born of the Virgin Mary is my Lord. At great cost he has saved and redeemed me, a lost and condemned person. He has freed me from sin, death, and the power of the devil. Not with silver or gold, but with his holy and precious blood and his innocent suffering and death. All this he has done that I may be his own, live under him in his kingdom, and serve him in everlasting righteousness, innocence, and blessedness, just as he is risen from the dead and lives and rules eternally.

The Third Article: I believe in the Holy Spirit, the holy catholic Church, the communion of saints, the forgiveness of sins, the resurrection of the body, and the life everlasting. Amen.

What does this mean? I believe that I cannot by my own understanding or effort believe in Jesus Christ my Lord, or come to him. But the Holy Spirit has called me through the Gospel, enlightened me with his gifts, and sanctified and kept me in true faith. In the same way he calls, gathers, enlightens, and sanctifies the whole Christian church on earth, and keeps it united in Jesus Christ in the one true faith. In this Christian church day after day, he fully forgives my sins and the sins of all believers. On the last day he will raise me and all the dead and give me and all believers in Christ eternal life.

A refuge against the storms of satan and the world. The dove and olive branch is God's promise that he will never again destroy the world by flood.



Bundle of Wheat: Wheat represents the true believers in Christ as well as the bread used in communion.



Depiction of the Ten Commandments, as they were originally given on two tablets of stone. The first tablet contains the first three commandments, which concern our relationship to God. The commandments of the second tablet (4-10) tell us how we should live with our neighbors.

The Altar

The following information is taken from; The Altar Guild, A guide for the Ministry of Liturgical Preparations, S. Anita Stauffer 1978 copyright Fortress Press.

This is just another part of our service that some may be wondering about. Our formal communion service is done with great reverence which is appropriate to God's house. Reverence is a deep feeling of awe and respect and thanksgiving in the presence of the almighty God. Reverence is reflected and expressed in the way we speak and act, and in how we handle the things of worship and care for the altar, in our attitude toward our fellow servants of the liturgy and in our own worship and prayer.

The Altar represents God's presence in the church, it is fitting that we act and speak reverently whenever we are in the church. This should be whether its Saturday getting the altar ready or Sunday worshiping. We need to act in a way which befits our devotion to our Lord. This may mean entering the Nave or chancel to carry out Altar Guild responsibilities. We may kneel and pray and ask that the work be done to the glory of God. This may also mean to bow before the altar, or making the sign of the cross. The spirit of reverence is shown in the way we speak walk and act. Outside actions are not enough, however, they are worthless if they do not flow out of hearts full of love for God and obedience to his will. The altar is the focal point of the church. We will try to educate and inform you if you do not already know about the routine preparations that are done prior to any worship service, whether it be regular Sunday morning service, wedding or funeral or other special service. Routine procedures and to care for the linens, paraments, flowers, candles, torches, bulletins, hymns and how and why it is done will be a part of this section every issue and hope that it helps you to understand more about our service and liturgy and why we do what we do.

The members of the Altar Guild have a very important part in our worship service and we hope this helps you to understand the importance and dedication and love for God that these members have.

This part of the church and serving it is a ministry of preparation and helps make your worship more personal and meaningful. We will try to educate and inform you so that it may help you to understand how everything comes together for service and helps make your worship more personal and meaningful.

ROUTINE PREPARATION

1. Clean the chancel, make sure all furnishings and appointments are in place and remove anything that will not be used in the service, such as vases if no flowers.
2. Make sure the proper linens and paraments are clean and are in designated liturgical color for the day or occasion.
3. Place the missal in its stand in readiness for use by the pastor, marking the pages according to Pastor's directions.
4. Arrange flowers and put them in place.
5. Make sure candles are in place and wicks are upright and ready to light.
6. If hymn board make sure correct hymn numbers are placed on it.
7. Put bulletins in place for acolytes and Pastor
8. See that the vestments for the Pastor and Acolytes are clean and pressed

The Altar Continued

9. If the Eucharist or Holy Baptism is to be celebrated, prepare the sacramental vessels, elements, and linens according to the Pastor's preference.
10. If a processional cross, torches, or banner is to be used, be sure its stand is in place.

There are routine procedures to be carried out after service as well. The flowers, flower vases, missal and missal stand are removed from the chancel and placed in the sacristy. Flowers are distributed to the sick, and shut-in. The other items are kept in the sacristy till next service. Soiled linens or paraments are removed and cleaned. Anything else, such as hymnals, bulletins, Kleenex shall be removed from the chancel. Paraments shall be changed according to the calendar.

The next issues will feature more about the furnishings of the church and altar and their significance. We hope this is helpful and informative.

Stewardship: We were created to be stewards of God’s creation through our work. There are many passages concerning stewardship in the Bible that tell us this, but the following are important because they give us a biblical framework for stewardship in our lives.

Genesis 1:28- God blessed them. God said to them, “Be fruitful and multiply and fill the earth and subdue it, and have dominion over the fish of the sea and over the birds of the heavens and over every living thing that moves on the earth.” Genesis 1:28 is the original call to stewardship. Its’ where God first calls humanity to cultivate and care for his creation using the unique gifts and talents he has endowed to every person.
